

Thoughts on gardening in January

Most likely everyone is still recovering from the festivities of Christmas and the New Year and not thinking of the garden or gardening.

If the Christmas-flowering hyacinths and other bulbs have been kept back for January, then they must now be brought out from the dark and cold and gently accustomed to an increasing heat. It is always a touch of spring to have these flowers out of their true season. If you have received an amaryllis bulb as a present then now is the time to get it started. It is also worth looking around the plant and flower stands of the most well-known supermarkets, as they are often selling off amaryllis at knock-down prices in order to clear their shelves.

A walk in the garden in January can often be a very pleasurable, if cold, activity. Have a look out for how many early flowers and flowering shrubs you may have. You may well be surprised by what you find!

There are gardens which are open for their winter colour and of course later, some gardens specialising in snowdrops. In this area there is Rode Hall, on the outskirts of Alsager, which is normally open in February, with its snowdrop walk.

However, we should curb our enthusiasm to get out onto the soil when wet or walk on the grass if frosted or snow-covered. The greenhouse can always do with a tidy up and, if growing vegetables, there are some seeds to be sown at this early stage.

There is not a Garden Club Meeting in January, so the next one will be February 11th, in the Community Centre and will be "Plants for Problem Places" given by Peter Foley of Holden Clough Nursery. The meeting begins at 8.00pm and tea or coffee is served after the talk. You are very welcome to come as a visitor or you may think of joining.

Planning is at an advanced stage to have B.B.C. "Gardeners' Question Time" hosted by the Garden Club in May. Dates, time and location will follow when all is confirmed. The Club has had to wait a good ten years for Kingsley to get this far.

WHAT IS YOUR VIEW ON AFFORDABLE HOUSING?

In recent years, the dramatic rise in property values has led not only to first time buyers but also people on modest incomes being priced out of the market in rural areas. Yet these are exactly the people who often work in key service areas (such as the local Primary School teacher), contribute greatly to the local community or who have strong ties to the village.

People are being forced to move out of villages, away from communities in which they have lived and contributed. Affordable housing gives local people the opportunity to stay – where at the moment they have little option.

Rural affordable schemes are small scale not large scale developments. We are typically looking at up to around 12 properties on individual sites.

Where a village has an identified need, the new occupants will be limited to those with an already established connection to the village.

Providing homes that are more affordable means providing both rented housing and shared ownership. Shared ownership (now sometimes referred to as Home Buy) allows people to purchase usually between a 25% and a 75% share in the property they live, so they pay part mortgage and part rent. The proportion of shared ownership and rented accommodation on any development is determined by the level of demand for each in that area.

A legal agreement would be included to limit stair casing, or the share of ownership in a property, to 80% (for every occupant) to help ensure properties remain affordable in the future.

Affordable housing does not mean poor quality housing. Building Regulations must still be enforced.

Provision of affordable housing is not limited to new development. Whenever possible it includes utilising existing redundant property.

Our Parish Council has raised concerns about the lack of affordable housing in the area and has decided to conduct a survey on the subject around March. A questionnaire will be sent out and its intention is to gather the views of the wider community on the provision of affordable housing in the Parish and establish the degree of need for affordable housing from people with a local connection to the Parish.

CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF SCOUTING

2007 was the Centenary of Scouting and therefore a year of celebrations throughout the Scouting movement with many events taking place to celebrate this landmark year. The main event being the International Jamboree at Hylands Park, Essex, which was enjoyed by 42,000 Scouts.

As part of the celebrations a replica was re-enacted of the original camp on Brownsea Island, this was the start of the Scouting movement. I was lucky enough to be one of only 42 Scouts chosen to take part in this.

The camp was an authentic replica of the original camp set up by Lord Baden-Powell and we lived in bell tents, dressed in Edwardian clothes (as picture above) and even slept in woollen blankets inside hessian sacks (definitely not as warm as a modern sleeping bag!)

During the camp we undertook activities that would have been popular in Edwardian times, such as archery, leatherwork, tracking, semaphore, pioneering and first aid. On 1st August at 8.00am all Scouts worldwide renewed their promise to Scouting.

I especially enjoyed meeting the many visitors and other Scouts from all over the world. It has also given me an excellent insight into what life was like 100 years ago. I am particularly proud of the replica Fleur de Lys badge presented to me, together with other momentos and treasured memories from this experience.

The culmination of the Scout celebrations was 'Live 07' concert held at the 02 Arena in London on November 24th. All the participants in the replica camp were invited to appear in this show and I was thrilled to perform in front of 15,000 people in each of the two performances.

I even had my picture taken with the Chief Scout, Peter Duncan (right)..

Get Smart!

Community fire safety Advocates in Cheshire are urging people to Get Smart!

Nearly two thirds of all domestic fires happen because of cooking. That's an awful lot of fires. The kitchen is the single most dangerous place in your home.

7,000 people are injured in kitchen fires each year (and that doesn't include people who are killed). Don't be one of them. Know what to do and what not to do in the kitchen.

Cooker

- · Keep electrical leads from trailing over or going near the cooker.
- · Don't hang tea towels or cloths on or over the cooker.
- Keep the oven, hob and grill clean. A build-up of fat and bits of food can start a fire.

① Electrical

- · Keep electrical leads away from water.
- Don't put a plant pot or anything wet on top of an electrical appliance.
- Check the toaster is clean and well away from curtains.
- Don't overload sockets one plug per socket is the rule, especially if the appliance takes a lot of power (like a kettle).
- Don't run extension cables across the floor as they can become worn.
- Electrical appliances especially those that work at high speeds, such as the washing machine - should be serviced each year.
- Don't leave appliances such as washing machines or dishwashers on at night.
- Is the kettle leaking? This can be dangerous.

Microwave

- · Don't put anything metallic inside the microwave.
- Don't dry clothes in the microwave.
