

In our June 2005 edition of the Kingsley News we published an article called 'LIFE'. I would like to share it again with you today.

Ratty, Mole, Badger and Toad will be on stage in Kingsley at the end of January in a new musical version of Kenneth Graham's much-loved classic story, 'Wind in the Willows', first premiered at the London Palladium in 2017.

Award-winning Kingsley Players will be giving five performances of this charming tale, which has been delighting readers and audiences since the novel was first published more than a century ago.

Julian Fellowes, creator of Downton Abbey, is behind this latest adaptation, which features a range of wonderful songs from Messing About on a Boat to the Wild Wooders, Spring and Mr Toad's Speed is of the Essence.

Director Lynn Pegler said: "We have a fantastic cast who are bringing this wonderful tale to life. Although the original Wind in the Willows was based around the River Thames, the story could easily have been set in Cheshire. The county's beautiful scenery has been my inspiration for our version and audiences may spot some familiar scenes.

"Close your eyes and you can just imagine strolling along the River Weaver and spotting Ratty and Mole's rowing boat in the reeds or chancing upon Badger's burrow or the glinting eyes of stoats and weasels in Delamere Forest. Do come and see if the arrogant, over-the-top Mr Toad really can mend his ways!"

'Wind in the Willows', with music and lyrics by Olivier Award-winning duo George Stiles and Anthony Drewe, will be on stage at Kingsley Theatre in Kingsley Community Centre, from Wednesday 25 to Saturday 28 January 2023, 7.30pm, with a Saturday matinee, 2.30pm.

The Kingsley Walkers group brought their programme for 2022 to a close in a very satisfactory fashion. On 22nd November we had a 9 mile walk around Chirk. Starting from the castle we covered lovely countryside, crossed the 220 metre long Chirk Aqueduct (not to be confused with its 307m and higher cousin the Pontcysyllte) before a sunny lunch stop alongside the canal and next to the Chirk Tunnel (420 metres). Here we listened to the dulcet tones of a diesel engined narrow boat spluttering through the tunnel and an echoing altercation as the skippers of two boats 'discussed' the right of way. We then walked through the tunnel ourselves before exchanging conversation with a fleet of about 20 canoeists and paddle boarders heading the other way.

On December 13th we met at the Carriers Inn with a 6 mile long walk heading West into the Forest and a 4 mile short walk group heading East. The Inn was waiting for grit to arrive to treat their car park and as some of us stumbled and slipped we were treated to a spectacular ice driving approach from one member arriving a little late. In a rush but no harm done.

After the walks we dumped boots and woolly hats and 33 people convened for our annual Christmas Lunch. We would very much like to thank Joanne and her staff at the Carriers Inn for the very friendly and efficient service and the chef for the extremely tasty meals across all courses and choices. After lunch we were treated to the sight of said chef spreading the just arrived grit and chipping away at the ice in the car park.

As well as Christmas and New Year wishes, there was a big thank you to all the walk leaders who have given us a varied programme through 2022. Personally, I have made many good friends through the group since my "incoming" to Kingsley and I am sure our community of walkers will be just as welcoming for years to come.

I am sure we will have a varied and exciting programme in 2023. Commitments have already been made to lead some of the future short walks (3-5 miles, second Tuesday of each month) and the long walks (7-9 miles, fourth Tuesday).

A bit of background - The WI came into being in 1915, the first institute being opened in Llanfairpwllgwyn on Anglesey. It is based on the ideals of fellowship, truth, tolerance and justice. Starting with its roots in rural and agricultural areas it now embraces the interests of women in both rural and urban communities. It set out to give women a voice, to be a force for good in the community. It was a place to share experiences, learn new skills, a place to make friends.

Kingsley WI

Kingsley WI began in 1919, when 51 members were enrolled after a visit by Mrs Paget, wife of the Lord Bishop of Chester, inspired them to form their own Institute. There is a planter maintained by the WI celebrating this event at the junction of Brookside and Dark Lane. We now have 28 members and meet on the first Wednesday of the month at 7.30pm in the Community Centre. In the early days the subjects they covered ranged from 'Umbrella Mending' to a visit from 'The Herring Marketing Board' during the war. Not to be outdone, this year we have had 'Secrets of Health from the

Kingsley WI belongs to **Weaver Vale Group** which includes
Kingsley, Norley, Crowton,
Acton Bridge, Frodsham, Helsby
and Round Tower. At least two
meetings a year are held, one
in May which is an evening event,
and one in October. in the



afternoon. This combining of a number of WIs means that more can be spent on the speakers and it is a chance to get together with other Institutes.

Kingsley is also part of the **Cheshire Federation of Women's Institutes** which has offices in Chester. They arrange events and activities throughout the year in which Kingsley members can choose to participate and publish the monthly County newsletter, Cheshire News, recently being sent out on-line to hopefully save a few trees!

At the top is **The National Federation of Women's Institutes** based, of course, in London. There are 220,000 members in more than 6000 WIs. The Federation publishes the magazine, WI Life, which is received by every member. Over the years the National Federation has, following resolutions suggested and voted on by all members at the AGM, been active in promoting many issues which have become nationwide. In the past there have been campaigns on banning smoking in public places, equal pay, breast cancer screening, and very famously, the Keep Britain Tidy movement came out of a resolution at the WI AGM. More recent resolutions have been on Food Matters, Carers Welcome in Hospitals, Climate Change, More Midwives, SOS for Honeybees – a very comprehensive list showing the desire of the WI to bring about change.

CLIMATE ACTION

AT KINGSLEY COMMUNITY PRIMARY AND NURSERY SCHOOL

Mrs Ruth Basden, Chair of Climate Action Frodsham (CAF) supported by Mr Allan Arthur, member of CAF, recently made a presentation to the Year 6 at the school regarding climate change and actions that can be taken to protect the environment.

After introductions and references to COP 27, Ruth stressed the importance and need of urgent action to reduce carbon emissions to save the planet for future generations. The Year 6 pupils described their different interests and discussion centred on the importance for the environment and the natural world in the fulfilment of those interests. Therefore the need for urgent action......

The school has an Eco-Council and Ruth was keen to tell pupils of a simple strategy to help pupils and the Council decide what action to take to protect the environment involving the steps of 'RESEARCH', 'DECIDE' 'PLAN' and 'ACTION'. The children then became involved in identifying ideas for action ranging from contacting your MP, to walking and cycling more and cutting consumption and waste. Ruth said that talking about the changes you are making at school, at home and at clubs or gatherings is so important to help other people to understand what you are doing and to encourage them to make changes too. The session ended with a brief Q&A session.

Ruth thanked the school for the opportunity to speak and the pupils for their attention. Leaflets were than left for subsequent distribution regarding CAF's Big Green Day and the application of the simple strategy at school, at home and at social gatherings.

MS Di Reeves, Teacher Years 5/6 wrote to Ruth to say "Many thanks once again for your time and energy and inspiring our Year 6s. The children loved the session and took the CAF leaflets home. The booklets - Planet Protectors look ace - packed with useful information.

We've a whole school assembly today from our Y6 eco-council leaders which should be great too. I'll be back in touch"



RED BULL'S


GREENHOLME THOINX

Readers may well remember the Lord Mayor's black pony in attendance at the Red Bull's May Fayre this summer. But few of us may have realised that we were in the presence of a champion!

Greenholme Knight is a fell pony, born on the Cumbrian fells six years ago, and was picked out at the sales by Ciaran, who obviously saw potential in the little black fluffy foal. Knight is the same breed as the late Queen's pony, "Emma" who came to fame showing her respects to her late mistress as the coffin approached Windsor Castle. Two years ago, when Red Bull landlords Ciaran and Terry were not pulling pints, they began the task of breaking in Knight. According to Terry, this was helped by the pony's very placid temperament which he likened to a well-natured dog!

So far 2022 has been a successful year for Knight. The highlights included winning the ridden fell pony class at the Royal Cheshire Show in June where he was competing against twenty-five other ponies. Ciaran's diligent preparation to make sure Knight looked his best and Terry's work riding him in the show ring had certainly impressed. This meant Knight qualified for the

prestigious Horse of the Year Show. So, in October the Red Bull team went off to spend a few days in Birmingham. Their efforts paid off as Knight, ridden by Terry came eighth in the final. There had been an earlier trek down south to Hickstead in July, where Knight had come second in the Junior Riders' class at the Royal International Horse. Quite a summer. However, Greenholme Knight's year is not over yet! He's off to the London International Horseshow in December...... so, nip into the pub for an update!







Dear Villager,

January Edition.

Since this is the first K.C.A. Newsletter of 1975 I thought it a good idea to reveiw briefly the Associations achievments of the past year and our hopes for the future. K.C.A. has two objectives as defined in its Constitution. These are first, to further the social and recreational interests of the residents of Kingsley and,

second, to provide a Community Centre for the Village.

As regards the first aim 1974 has seen the successful formation of a committee led by Tony Whitby, our Vice Chairman who have done much to cater for the social needs of the village. Especially worthy of mention are the 8 - 12 yearolds Disco's and the Bingo sessions organised by them which have helped to provide social gatherings for the less mobile in the community. The many other events organised by them and by the fund raising committee led by Fred Kells have provided entertainment and opportunity for social contact for people of a variety of tastes on many occasions during the year. perhaps the best example being the revived Kingsley Carnival.

We are well on our way towards meeting our second aim at the present time since work should start in the next week or two on construction of the Kingsley Community Centre. Actually this may be a rather grandiose title for what is really a Village Hall, since the first phase of the project will provide just that. It is our hope that it may further develop into a true Community Centre later when hopefully the Country present financial problems are easier. We must thank all of those who have given of both their time and money in helping to raise funds to make this possible. At the end of 1974 our bank balance was £2950, well over £1,000 of which was raised during 1974. We must also thank those who have spent a very considerable amount of time in negotiations and planning in connection with the project. Especially I would like to thank the "Building Committee" led by Norman Clough for the considerable work they have put in during 1974.

We enter 1975 confident that K.C.A. is in a healthy condition; that this is so is due in large measure to the whole hearted support given to it by you, the villagers of Kingsley. Thank you all. May I end by wishing you all a much happier

New Year than we have been led to expect.
