KINGSLEY: THE STORY OF A CHESHIRE VILLAGE

A book with this title was published in 1975, authored by William Gibson and Alan Waterworth. The book reprinted a number of articles about Kingsley written by William Gibson and published in the Cheshire Chronicle in the 1950s, together with two essays written by Alan Waterworth. The book had a limited print run, although there are probably quite a few copies on bookshelves in Kingsley, and has never been reprinted, to my knowledge.

Now we are two, or even three, generations on from original publication, it is perhaps time for the Kingsley story to be re-told.

The Domesday Book

No local history, however brief, is ever considered respectable without at least some reference to the Domesday Book, that great valuation list which the Commissioners of William I completed in 1086 so that the Norman Conqueror might know the full extent and value of his Conquest. A modern translation of the mediaeval Latin entry for Kingsley tells us:-

Dunning, who was Lord of the Manor before the Conquest, still holds it and now pays homage to the Earl of Chester. Tax can be assessed on 120 acres and there are a further 240 acres, half of which is farmed direct by Dunning with the aid of 5 slaves, 1 villein and 3 bordars. In Kingsley there is one large and one small fishery, a wood one and a half miles long and the same wide and the whole area is subject to the laws of the Royal Forest. There is also a hawk's nest and four enclosures (hays) for taking Roedeer. In Edward the Confessor's time (the last Saxon King) the manor was worth 30 shillings but now it is only worth 6 shillings.

Nothing is known about Dunning except that he was one of the very few Saxon thegns (lords) who retained his lands after the Conquest. He was probably a moneyer in Chester and his name appears on coins minted there until 1066. Villeins often worked two or three a week for the lord and received in return about 20 acres of land on which to support their families. Bordars worked only about one day a week for the lord and received perhaps ten acres for themselves. Slaves, who could be bought and sold, were landless and dependent for food and lodging upon the lord of the manor.

One of the fisheries would almost certainly be on the river at Pickerings. The river was well known for its salmon and the local placename Crewood is derived from the Celtic word CRYW which means "a kind of wicker-work woven fence across a river to catch fish". It was the responsibility of the lord of the manor to maintain the fisheries and to keep the hays in good condition. A hay was an enclosure in the forest for taking deer and it is likely that at least one of those mentioned would be near the river where the deer went to drink. It is tempting to associate these four hays with Hall of the Hey, Higher Heyes, Hare Heyes and Lady Heyes – place names which still exist in Kingsley today.

Hawks, of course, were highly valued, and it was important to know where replacements could be obtained. In the breeding season, the young birds were carefully guarded until old enough to be removed to the falconer's mews. Sparrowhawks' Clough, a place-name that died out in the eighteenth century, lay halfway between Hall of the Hey and the fishery at Pickerings. This is the only place-name in the area referring to hawks and it is possible that this was the site referred to in the Domesday Book. The possibility is further strengthened by the fact that the Gerrards, who owned Sparrowhawks' Clough from at least 1248, incorporated a hawk's lure in their crest.

William the Conqueror laid waste most of Northern England and this usually accounts for the substantial decline in land value that had occurred since Edward the Confessor's time. In the case of Kingsley, however, this decline was probably due to the amount of land lost to the royal hunting grounds of Mara and Mondrem. This great forest stretched as far south as Nantwich and included the whole of what we now know as Delamere Forest.

<u>Place Names</u>

There are no less than forty-three variants of Kingsley as a place name since it first appears as **Chingeslie** in the Domesday Book.

The following are a selection of other local place names together with the year in which the earliest form of the name appeared.

VYRNWY AQUEDUCT MODERNISATION PROGRAMME

Since 1892, the Vyrnwy Aqueduct, which runs from Lake Vyrnwy through to Merseyside, has helped deliver clean drinking water to customers and communities across Cheshire, Merseyside and the North West region. However, the pipeline now requires work to ensure the quality of the drinking water.

United Utilites have already refurbished 40% of the pipe and will now be completing the remaining length from Malpas through to Merseyside between now and 2028. Work on the Tarporley to Norton section (2023 – 2027) will include: Cotebrook, Delamere, Hatchmere, Kingsley, Aston and Runcorn.

KINGSLEY PARISH COUNCIL

January 2023

The Parish Council met for its first meeting of 2023 on the 17th January, in Kingsley Community Centre and there were three members of the public present. During this meeting we welcomed our latest Co-opted Councillor Mark Owen, this has brought our number up to seven Councillors. We would welcome more Councillors and we have room for a further four. At present we have only one female Councillor so, come on ladies we require a more balanced representation on YOUR Parish Council. Should you be interested, please contact the Parish Clerk through the email address below.

One member of the public who addressed the Council represented CWAC, advising of the plans by FACTCO the proposed broadband supplier, supported by CWAC, looking to bring faster broadband connections to the rural communities. Whilst weekly clinics are held in Crowton, and residents of Kingsley are welcome to attend, it was felt that a meeting in Kingsley at the Community Centre would be more beneficial to Kingsley residents. The Parish Council will work with FACTCO to put in place such a meeting which will be advertised in Kingsley News, Kingsley Facebook and the Kingsley & Parish Council websites once a date has been agreed.

A full tree survey has been undertaken on Kingsley Playing Fields and Kingsley Cemetery, and a report issued to the Council. This report will be made available on the Parish Council website for anyone to look at. The report has recommended the felling of a small number of trees on both sites as these are considered to be in a poor condition. These High Priority works will be undertaken this Financial Year (ending 31st March 2023).

KINGSLEY PARISH COUNCIL

January 2023

Our CWAC Ward Councillor, Cllr Hugo Deynam, was present throughout the meeting, and reported that a Manual Gritter would be provided to the community, funded by Cllr Deynam's Members Budget. This Gritter, although possibly too late for his winter, will be available for hire next winter for community use, with grit provided by CWAC. Details on how this may be hired will be provided later this year.

Discussions continue to be had with CWAC over the adoption of Middle Lane Playing Field by Kingsley Parish Council, it is clear that at present, this adoption will require it to be maintained as a sports facility, and grants will be sought by the Parish Council to enhance the facilities provided at present.

Similar discussions are also continuing with CWAC regarding the provision of Community Orchards at both Middle Lane and Kingsley playing fields. It is hoped to have these discussions concluded and the trees planted by the end of March 2023.


