KINGSLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The meeting held on April 4th in the Community Centre was opened by the singing of "Jerusalem". The President pointed out nesting boxes and a bird table on display. These are made to order by the son of Elizabeth Wilson and are environmentally friendly.

She announced that last month's speaker had made £30 from the sale of Fair Trade goods, and the Darts team had come second in the Group match. The record of the Annual Council Meeting was available. During it a resolution, urging members to buy local produce in season, so saving food miles and helping to combat climate change, was passed. Books of vouchers from Yorkshire Tea had been received and, with them, a note pointing out that, though they deal with family firms rather than co-operatives , they make sure that wages and prices are fair.

Advanced booking is now available for the Cheshire Show; helpers would be given free entry. Three pictures had been brought for the Hornby Cup competition and we voted for the one to be submitted. Details were given of the play "Death by Fatal Murder" which the Kingsley Players are performing in May and it was suggested that members might like to go to the Friday performance which would be preceded by a supper.

Future events in April include two walks – one on the 16^{th} in the Crowton area and one on the 23^{rd} which would end with refreshments, in aid of the RSPCC, in Alvanley; lunch at The Millpool on the 20^{th} ; a resolution meeting on the 18^{th} and the Fashion Show by Suzanne of Frodsham on the 24^{th} . Members were reminded that refreshments provided for this last event need to be "pick up" size.

The Treasurer encouraged members to Gift Aid their W.I. subscriptions.

The talk, entitled "Birds in the Garden", was given by Robert Adams. He provided some interesting information about the various eating and nesting habits of birds we might see in our gardens. We were reminded that some foods eg. salted peanuts and uncooked rice were not good to put out and that water was essential, especially in winter, for their plumage. He showed many slides to help us identify the different species.

The Spring meeting on May 2^{nd} will comprise a discussion of, and vote on, the NFWI resolution, cheese and wine, and Fond Photographic Memories.



Please be aware that an elderly lady in Frodsham had received a flyer for gardening services. She called the company and they attended and agreed on a price. The work commenced, but the contractor increased the original amount asked for. This is now catered for under the new Fraud Act and an increase on payment agreed has to be agreed prior to the additional work commencing. The Police attended and checked out the contractor who is known to their Officers and passed his details to the Trading Standards.

Please be aware of this and if you have any problems report them either to the Police on the above number or to Trading Standards.

Telesales of replacement windows and doors

Trading Standards have numerous complaints about a trader offering to supply and fit windows, doors and conservatories. This trader makes an iinitial approach by telephone and is currently telling householders that they have won £1000 towards home improvements supplied by the trader.

The telephone call is followed up with a high pressure sales visit with the aim of getting a contract signed and securing a large deposit, as much as half of the total price of the work.

The trader does give the required written notice of cancellation rights and many complaints have been made to Trading Standards about failure to refund deposits when the householder has cancelled within the seven days allowed. The sums of money involved range from several hundred pounds up to £1500.

This trader is being actively pursued by Trading Standards. In the meantime householders are urged to be on their guard against traders who cold call in this manner offering inducements to have work done on their home.

MEETING 17 APRIL 2007

At the beginning of the meeting the Chairman gave an award to Councillor David Ogg who is retiring from the Council after 43 years continuous service. David moved to Kingsley in 1959 as Headmaster of what is now St John's School subsequently moving onto a school in Runcorn. He became a Parish Councillor in March 1964. The Council wish to express their thanks to David for his tremendous contribution to the village over the past 43 years.

1. Main Meeting

This was the last meeting before the May Elections and the actual Elections will be uncontested as there have only been 8 applications for Parish Councillors. Therefore there are 3 vacancies on the Council but due to a technical problem one of the existing Councillors will have to apply to co-opt onto the Council, so in effect there are two vacancies. If anybody is interested in applying to become a Parish Councillor please contact Doreen Woods whose details are shown on the Kingsley Parish notice board.

There is little to report in respect of this meeting other than that there have been one or two issues with litter being left at the Community Centre. Some youths are parking their car by the Community Centre on occasions and leaving rubbish. Some of the rubbish including cigarette ends and empty bottles also suggests that some illegal substances may be present. It has also been noted that a red car, driven by a female, has been seen in the same vicinity on occasions and the female occupant has been acting rather suspiciously.

The Police have been informed and are monitoring the situation. If anyone sees anything suspicious please advise your Local Community Police Officer, the Clerk to the Parish Council or the Police. Any information provided will be treated in the strictest confidence.

Footpaths & Playing fields

Over the past year there have been few complaints about the footpaths in the village and the Council continues to fund the cutting back of overgrowth to keep the footpaths open to all. It is pleasing to note that we now have a new footpaths notice board in which to display footpath activities and the sale of the walks maps has been well received. However due to the demand these are now being reprinted.

We are currently progressing the implementation of kissing gates to replace some stiles to give further access to people who have mobility problems who wish to walk along the public footpaths in Kingsley.

Any feedback on the footpaths is welcome.

The playing field is still without a play area but it is pleasing to note that funding is now available and it is hoped the new play area will be constructed within the next financial year. Efforts are in hand to establish a location which will reduce inconvenience to neighbouring residents. It is also intended to improve maintenance and security around the site.

A tree management plan has been prepared and work on the proposed scheme will commence shortly. This also will benefit neighbouring properties and enhance the appearance of the whole area. In the meantime the playing field will be cut in the normal manner.

Traffic & Transport

The introduction of the interactive 30mph sign in Hollow Lane will we hope, continue to keep the speed of traffic within the specified limits as will the new sign at the other end of the village.

Parking still causes a problem at various times around the Kingsley County Primary School and also in the area around the shops in Hollow Lane. The headmaster of the Primary School has given his full co-operation to trying to minimise the disruption to residents in the area.

Cattle warning signs have been introduced in Waterloo Lane which we hope will prevent any major accidents.

Cemetery

Council are pleased to report that completion of the construction of the new cemetery entrance which was officially opening on March 25th. It is felt that this will prove beneficial to visitors of the cemetery.

Unfortunately during the heavy winds experienced we had a tree that fell in the cemetery. This has been removed and we hope to replant as soon as possible.

KU 17 Group

The KU 17 Group continues to thrive and work is now commencing on the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. The number of members has grown to 67 with ages varying from 11 to 16 years.

The group has passed level one validation with the Youth Federation and is now working towards level two. The higher the level means more fundraising can be applied for through the group. This year new furniture was provided.

The group continue to enjoy various activities and have visited many interesting and exciting places throughout the year.

The aim of the group is to welcome young people to participate in a community focal point, for social, educational, sports and Arts pursuits for all ages. It is intended to imbue a sense of community family values, respect for others, themselves and for their environment, and of course most importantly to have fun.

Youth Issues

Further progress has been made within the village to encourage all teenage groups to make representing to KU 17 to become part of this increasingly popular activity.

This facility has in part contributed to less anti social behaviour being noted in the village, but that is not to say that reoccurring problems have all been resolved.

The various agencies have responded well to any concerns raised and when requested Kingsley has had increased police presence.

Councillor Jones has reported that acting as the village representative on this issue has been very rewarding but to maintain progress residents are asked to contact Parish Councillors if there are any concerns.

Web Site

It is felt that this site is now a good source of information on future events in the village, local businesses (Directory Section) and security issues through Home watch and the regular police updates. The Parish Council continue to provide regular reports and also the Litter Pick Team under the guidance of local resident Fiona MacDougall.

Other local groups such as the WI are also now beginning to use the site more regularly.

Support has also been provided via the site for genealogy issues.

Appreciation is expressed to Simon Sherlock for his untiring efforts in keeping the site up and running.

Kingsley News Monthly Magazine

It is pleasing to report that the Council now has a regular page in the newsletter and tries to keep residents informed of all important issues.

Community Liason

This is a new initiative set up by the Parish Council at the end of 2006. The principal object is to engage with the various groups in the village to set up a link with then to enable to Parish Council to be aware of their needs and future plans. The development of this opens opportunities both to enhance the Parish Council's involvement with local groups and also to open opportunities within the groups themselves for development within the community.

CHAIRMAN'S OVERVIEW

Firstly I would like to thank all fellow Councillors for their support and attendance during the past year. Special thanks go to Aaron bridges for organising and running the carnival last July which was a huge success.

It is hoped that our lowly placing of equal last in the Community Pride Competition will this year improve and the efforts of Fiona MacDougall and her clean up working parties will reap the benefit of a better position. Council have agreed to sponsor a Hanging Basket Competition and it is hoped that as many residents as possible will put up hanging baskets to enhance the village appearance.

This year has been dominated by the construction of the new cemetery entrance which started last September. It was officially opened on the 25th March 2007. Some of the railings surrounding the site have also been replaced.

One of the down sides to the year was a break in at the Cemetery building when a strimmer was stolen. A new more secure door has now been fitted and the new strimmer is no longer stored at these premises.

The Playing field has also caused some controversy over a boundary issue and the possible location of the proposed new play area. It is hoped that through discussions these can be resolved,

The Annual Parish Meeting held on the 20th March was again not well supported by local residents. This is very disappointing and it is hoped that next year will improve.

Finally, as my term of office is coming to a close I would like to give a vote of thanks to Councillor Ogg on behalf of the whole Council who is stepping down from the Parish Council after 43 years unbroken service to the Community. This record will last

PENTECOST

What's in a name? And why do they keep changing them? Wasn't 'Whitsun' good enough? And why 'Holy Spirit' – wasn't 'Holy Ghost' understood by most folk?

Perhaps you've heard these sorts of things being said – maybe even said something similar yourself. In a world of change such sentiments may come readily. Yet the recapturing' of 'Pentecost' takes us way back to Old Testament times – a reminder that the birthplace of Christianity is a small part of the Middle East. And the 'birthday of The Church' was around this time 50 days after the events of the first Easter. A time when Holy Sprit blew into the lives of hesitant people and gave them energy and boldness.

OK then. But why not 'Holy Ghost'? Well, perhaps ghosts are either something not to be believed in – or they induce fear and dread. Perhaps not the best word to describe the loving presence of God! In the life of the early Church the people knew they couldn't see Jesus physically – and yet they still experienced His life, power and presence. Why? GARDEN CLUB NEWS

Is pruning a mystery to you? It is, even to many gardeners! The idea that shrubs and trees should be pruned only in winter or maybe early in the spring clean-up dies hard.

Well, spring is the right time to prune some shrubs, especially those which have flowered in the early part of the year. So if, for example, you have Forsythia, flowering quince (Chaenomeles Japonica), flowering current (Ribes sanguineum) and Viburnum tinus, then now is the time to prune. This will encourage the new growth made later in the summer to flower next year. These are usually vigorous plants and can benefit from judicious pruning.

If in doubt about when and if to prune then take advice or as a fairly safe option take out 1/3 of the old branches each year for 3 years to finish up with a well balanced structure. This method is recommended for example for Philadelphus (Mock orange). Of course, virtually any time is good to cut out dead or damaged wood. Aim for a good shape to the finished job with air and light access.

A pest alert! If you grow lilies look them over for small red lily beetles which are best collected and squashed before they devour all the leaves. There appears to be a glut this year and gardeners report finding them on other plants, even those with tough leaves like Hellebores.
