Footpaths & Playing fields

There were no dramatic events in relation to footpaths this year. Some discussions had taken place about what should be included in the maintenance contract. Landowners were written to on one or two occasions about obstructions of footpaths on their land.

Replacement footpath signs carrying the new Cheshire West Logo have been erected which caused some surprise as it was felt some did not need replacing. However, it was understood all will be replaced in due course.

The footpath maps continued to sell, though more slowly over the winter months. These are available in the village at the pharmacy and the two pubs.

The past year has been very quiet in relation to the play areas. The play equipment has now been installed for a full year and is being well used. For insurance purposes an annual inspection of the play area has been carried out by an independent body. In addition weekly inspections are carried out locally.

A number of trees on the perimeter of the field had to be taken down for both safety and excessive shading reasons.

Once again our thanks go to the Kingsley Litter Pickers for the job they do keeping the village so clean and to the dog walkers for helping to keep the field clear of rubbish.

Traffic & Transport

Several highway issues have been covered during the last year. Some were successful, others are ongoing. The two areas being pursued during the coming year are to try to reinforce the parking restrictions outside the Kingsley Post Office by the introduction of new bollards (in line with existing) or new planters with accompanying signs. The second is to investigate the feasibility of re-opening- or re-introducing a water spout at the bottom of Dark Lane – which was covered over several years ago, and improving the existing wooden fencing along the brook adjacent to Brookside.

Items covered this year are detailed below:

Railings at Dark Lane/Top Road

Continuing to pursue this matter.

Brookside Erosion

CWAC have confirmed work to be carried out in the summer.

New pavement along Top Road (opposite Mansfield Road)

A small section of footway pavement across the grass verge to be constructed in the near future.

Withdrawal of Bus Service 27a to Chester

Council responded to several concerns raised by worried residents about this withdrawal and lobbied our County Councillors to look into this matter further on our behalf. Whilst this specific bus service was withdrawn (the decision was commercially based and taken by the operator as opposed to CWAC) we will continue to maintain awareness and vigilance on any future threat to bus services to and from the village.

Fencing along Football Pitches Depmore Lane

With the assistance of Councillor Riley new fencing has been obtained and will be installed soon).

Width Restriction of Driving at Dark Lane

Following various discussions with residents of Dark Lane regarding the problem caused by HGV's using the lane as a short cut to the village, we successfully negotiated the installation of new signage at the Norley Road end of Dark Lane. This achieved some moderate success. Further pursuit of this matter by Councillor Riley has more recently helped to get CWAC to undertake an assessment of the suitability of the current road width. The results have led to CWAC issuing a proposed notice to institute a width restriction on vehicles travelling along Dark Lane. There were some minor concerns that need to be addressed to enable certain agricultural vehicles to continue to use the lane but hopefully these will not prevent the notice from being formally made in the future.

Parking outside Kingsley St Johns on Hollow Lane

There has been an increased volume of cars being parked along Hollow Lane outside Kingsley St Johns School. Whilst the cars are legally parked there have been concerns raised that it has caused the road at this point to become significantly narrowed. Kingsley Parish Council has asked the School to consider advising that staff could make use of the car park near the Kingsley Community Centre to help to address this problem. This will be monitored over the coming months.

CWAC Highway Survey

Kingsley Parish Council responded to this survey in December 2009.

Cemetery

Following the theft of the cemetery gates in October 2008 a local resident Mark Lewis offered to make a set of new gates himself. After much discussion a design of the gates was agreed. Mark agreed to manufacture the gates free of charge if the Council purchased the materials. Again after discussions at the Red Bull, Steve the Landlord set up a collection for the materials and soon £200.00 was raised. This covered the cost of the materials. The gates were duly manufactured and officially opened in the summer of 2009. Council gave a big vote of thanks to both these residents for showing such community spirit.

There had been an attempted break into the Board Room at the cemetery without success. Some damage occurred which was repaired.

The sandstone wall along the boundary near the entrance gates was also damaged when a car skidded into it. This was repaired and paid for by the driver of the vehicle.

The Grit bin was unfortunately not filled during the bad weather despite repeated requests. We understand this will be filled during the next winter.

KU 17 Group

Membership numbers were up with between 20 and 30 young people attending every Thursday. The largest outlays were for the hire of the Community Centre and wages for the youth workers. However some additional equipment has been purchased.

The Group have also been out on several trips including ten pin bowling, Laser quest and Manley Mere. The group have had a very successful year and it was very pleasing to note that the young people's behaviour had been second to none.

Kingsley Parish Council are pleased that their contribution towards funding has enabled the village youngsters to have a safe and fun place to go every Thursday.

Youth Issues

There have been no problems this year which reflects favourably on the youth facilities in the village especially the KU17 and the Scouting organisation.

The Frodsham Helsby & Kingsley Community Action Group has been reformed which help to monitor and deal with problems and issues that arise throughout the area.

Web Site

The Kingsley Web continues to go from strength to strength with the majority of village organisations being readily available on line. It is important that all groups keep their details up to date.

Simon Sherlock continues to do an excellent job (withy very little reward) in the maintenance of the Web site and the Parish Council and the community once again offer it's thanks to Simon for his sterling work.

The website now offers a very rich resource in archive material from the last six years which provides people with useful information; the statistics show that the website is accessed from places as far away as Alaska and Australia, in total the website was accessed from 45 countries last year. On average it receives 17 unique visitors a day and it has received in excess of 6000 hits in the past year. There was also a trending increase during the last year for the website access which was a very good sign peaking with 200 visits a week in January.

Kingsley News Monthly Magazine

Kingsley Parish Council continues to submit articles each month in this magazine.

Community Liason

Community Pride/Carnival/Orchards

Firstly the good news. The Litter Pickers continues to do excellent work and Eila Birtwistle is to be congratulated for her persistence and skill in bringing new helpers whilst hanging on to the existing ones. The village really has benefited from their works and thanks are given to all of them.

Kingsley did quite well in the Community Pride competition in 2009 but disappointed with some of the scores. After approaching the organisers it was confirmed there had been some problems with the judging in 2009.

In 2009 Kingsley won the Police Safety Award for Cheshire – the title is misleading –this award related to how safe people in the village felt and what we did to help them. A key factor in winning the award was the KU17 group by giving teenagers somewhere to go and something to do. The success with keeping the play area safe and free from vandalism was also a factor.

Village Plan

This project made limited progress during the year. The Transition Initiative group were interested in taking part and an initial plan to launch the project at the 2010 carnival is to be made.

<u> 2010 Carnival – 26th June</u>

A larger and active committee have taken this on board with a circus being booked .In a break from tradition, the event will be held at the centre of the village using the St. John's School field as the centre.

CHAIRMAN'S OVERVIEW

During the past year the major project for the Parish Council was the continuation of the project for the provision of affordable housing for the village of Kingsley. A background and history of which can be found on the Kingsley Village Website. A lot of effort and consultation went into the selection of the site and the way in which the allocation of these homes would be made. The Parish Council ensured that as far as it was possible, the residents of Kingsley would have the highest priority in the allocation. It is now understood that the planning application has been approved.

The play area has now seen its first full year of use and the surrounding area has been seeded. It was very pleasing to see how much use was being made of the facilities by all age groups.

Thanks were paid to the Red Bull and Mr. Lewis for organising the collection and replacing the cemetery gates.

Thanks were also given to all the Councillors for making the Chairman's role an easy one and also to the Clerk for keeping the Council on the straight and narrow.

Christian Aid Week 9th - 15th May 2010

Making decisions about which charities to donate to can be difficult. There are so many good causes and we all have a view on which are more deserving than others. During Christian Aid week volunteers will be collecting in the village and surrounding areas. In order to help you make your decision about whether or not to give to Christian Aid here is an update of the work carried out during 2008/2009 that has been made possible because of your donations.

£16m has been spent on responding to emergencies. Christian Aid is not only there for the short term but continues to help with recovery and rehabilitation, supplying health care, food and other resources in places such as Bihar, Burma and Kenya.

£43.3m went to long term developments. Working with 600 partner organisations means that money is directed towards projects that are needed and will make a difference. For example sanitation toilet blocks have been built in some of the settlements (slums) in Nairobe. This is ongoing work that is not only reducing the incidence of disease but is raising the morale and self esteem of the people. £14.9m went towards campaigning, for example renegotiating the International Trade rules so that poorer countries are not unfairly treated or exploited and able to trade fairly. Christian Aid's goal is to empower people to take charge of their future in order to end poverty.



Le Velo Club - Kingsley



Le Velo Club is a collective of local guys who enjoy road bike riding.

The foundations of the group can be traced back to the "Old Gts Lands End – John O'Groats" charity rides of 2007 & 2008, where firstly 2 then 4 people completed the 900 mile "End to End". The group has grown steadily and last summer a 15 strong group rode from London to Paris and raised around £24000 for medical charities.

The peleton continues to grow further, there is a core of around 20 riders whom ride regularly and we would encourage anyone who feels like they want to get some fun and exercise to get back on their bike and join us. Most are from in or around the village a few are friends from a little farther afield but all are equally welcome, you don't have to be from Kingsley to be in our gang!

We now have our own website (www.levelodub.com) where we publish the planned rides/events we are attending. These are mainly 1 day 80-100 mile "Sportive" rides ie not races but timed to assess your own performance. For those less committed or unready to take on what appears to be a big challenge the usual Sunday moming training rides run all year round and are a good opportunity to begin, moreover with the imminent lighter evenings approaching there are often informal impromptu short training rides of 1-1.5 hours on offer within the team.

The planned pinnade for 2010 will be the St. Malo to Narbonne (Channel to the Mediterranean) ride in September, details are on the website along with information on how to contact us. Less formally you will find that most early evenings on a Friday a reasonable cross section of members can be found in the Red Bull warming up for the weekends training!


We also still have some team spaces available for Jacks golf day fundraiser on 25th May.
