Our staff have organised the recent cross country event for children aged 7-11 in Delamere Forest. This event had to be postponed because of the large snowfall in March.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

It has been a great honour and privilege to serve the community and I have enjoyed my time immensely as Chairman of the Parish Council.

One of my aims was to try and encourage the Parish Council and wider community to start delivering some of the key actions identified in the Parish Plan. Although much remains to be done, great progress has already been made – the resurgence of the KU17's, the community planting project and the new Christmas lights display were particular highlights. Other projects are still

in development – a new community transport group was established and a speeding survey undertaken with the help of village volunteers and 3 new benches and a replacement information board will be installed early in 2013/14. The Carnival was once again a huge success and we have received useful presentations from various outside organisations and hosted a CWAC community event on behalf of ClIr Ralph Oultrum. Our responses to important planning applications are more detailed and considered and our relationship with CWAC highways has been re-established. I am sure that this progress will continue in the year ahead under the guidance of the new Chair.

PLAY AREAS

The play area continues to be well used. Our new contractor for maintaining the playing field, Northwich Town Council, has performed well and has carried out repairs to the juniors' climbing frame and one of the gates. The play equipment continues to be inspected on a weekly basis and on an annual basis by an independent body for insurance purposes. The Kingsley Litter Pick team and dog walkers continue to help keep the playing field clear of litter. Thanks also to the team who open and close the gate leading into the playing field.

CEMETERY

The contractor, Richard Cheetham, has done a good job. He has been awarded the contract again for 13/14. Austin Walker, who has been our other maintenance worker for well over 10 years, was given a new updated Contract of Employment and, a long overdue, pay increase. The biggest project this year was organising the re-surfacing of the original footpaths around the cemetery. This was completed in January.

HIGHWAYS/TRAFFIC

The Parish Council continues to meet CWAC on a regular basis. Removal of a lighting column outside St Johns Church to improve safety of users on the footpath has taken place and markings at junctions and double yellow lines have been refreshed. Drains and gullies were cleared in January to help ease the drainage system around the village. We are also hoping to replace damaged grit bins and tackle flooding issues (specifically at Mill Lane).

Last Autumn, the Parish Council worked with CWAC and a group of local volunteers to monitor speeds at various points around the village with a mobile speed indicator device. Analysis suggested that extreme speeds were quite limited, but we will continue to monitor the situation and carry on working with CWAC to encourage safer speeds with the village. We also hope to work with adjacent Parish Councils when CWAC undertake a speed limit review from Frodsham through to Weaverham in 2013/14. There is still plenty of work to be done to tackle some of the parking issues in the village and we will continue to explore new ways of making things better.

FOOTPATHS

The condition of the footpaths and most stiles in Kingsley are satisfactory however the wet weather has made some of the more rural paths very muddy and difficult to use. A number of concerns have been addressed such as obstructing greenery and cleaning of steps but not all issues have been resolved. We will continue to liaise with CWAC to resolve some of the putstanding work.

KU 17 CLUB

Attendance currently stands at about 15-20 young people each week. There are currently 6 KU17 committee members and the post of Vice-Chair is open to volunteers. Details of the audited accounts for 2012/13 will be presented at KU17s AGM in April/May. The club is now in credit, thanks to the pledges of many local organisations and businesses that permitted fund-raising activities, and the energies of the KU17s themselves. The committee are also working on updating the control documentation for the club and considering a dedicated website.

VILLAGE ENHANCEMENT

Last September, volunteers from the community planted 14,000 spring bulbs on grass verges in and around the village. The Parish Council would like to thank: Catherine Tweedie for organising the entire project; her small group of planting leaders'; all the volunteers that helped to plant the bulbs; David Holt and CWAC for their assistance and financial contribution.

In December, we were delighted to see Kingsley's first ever public display of Christmas lights thanks to a very generous donation of £2000 from the developers of the new affordable homes in the village. We were also very grateful to the Co-operative Group, Kingsley St. John's Primary School and to ocal tradesmen who helped us to get the project off the ground.

New benches and a new noticeboard will also be provided shortly thanks to funding from Councillor Ralph Oultrum via CWAC's Ward Councillor budget.

CARNIVAL

The Carnival took place in June at Kingsley Community Primary School. The orocession set off in the rain, with floats from the Guides and Brownies, Kingsley Traders, and both Kingsley schools. They were joined by classic cars and even some horses. We also had the Chester Centurions, circus skills, a bouncy castle and a variety of stalls. There were a record number of sponsors this year raising £960. In addition to the events on the field there was a Scarecrow competition with an Olympic theme. This drew a number of numorous and inventive entries. As ever, the Carnival would not have happened at all without the help of many people.

COMMUNITY LIAISON

Organisations and individuals have been supported and encouraged to pursue some of the actions identified in the Parish Plan. In addition to the bulb planting, a children's tennis club has started up at the tennis courts at the Village Institute and a new theatre group is thriving.

KINGSLEY WEB

The website is still providing the village with an extremely useful resource. Overall visits in 12/13 are up 5.49% and there is an increasing number of visitors from mobile and tablet devices. We are considering upgrading the website in 13/14. The Facebook page continues to provide a valuable resource for lively discussion and membership has grown to over 200. The Parish Council would like to offer its thanks to Simon Sherlock for all his effort in maintaining the website.

FARM UPDATE MAY 2013

NEWS & VIEWS FROM YOUR LOCAL FAMILY FARM

Halleluiah, after seven long and wet months, spring finally arrived in mid-April. The biting cold easterly winds that had been with us for months were pushed away by mild south-westerly winds. Grass turned from brown to green overnight, wheat and barley stood upright as if they were interested in growing again and daffodils burst open at last. The snow and blizzards we had in mid-March were unprecedented. We had snow six inches deep and drifts six foot deep. Grass and cereals stopped in their tracks, and the oil seed rape, which had just started to recover, seemed to go backwards. We were worried that the few potatoes we had planted in February would be frozen in the ground. Time will tell, if and when they emerge. We started selling our new potatoes on 3rd May last year. We will be lucky to sell any by 3rd June this year.

It was the coldest spell in March for 100 years, and has put spring back even further. Ironically, when it did warm up the warm winds turned into gales and blew a lot of the fleece off the potatoes in the field. It battered the emerging daffodils and sent litter and debris blowing across our fields. You just can't win!! Incidentally, the newly planted daffodils all around Kingsley village are quite stunning at the moment. They are a month late but look great. Congratulations to all those involved in planting them last autumn.

The debate on Genetically Modified food and plants hit the headlines again last month, when a company in the US was granted a licence to produce salmon which had a gene from an eel and a growth hormone inserted. This makes them grow twice as fast as normal; therefore they would be cheaper to rear and theoretically cheaper to buy. The fish would be sterile and raised in tanks inland not in the sea. Other aims of the GM industry are:

To breed cows that produce milk which is closer to human breast milk cutting the chance of allergic reactions. Chickens resistant to bird-flu and pigs resistant to swine flu.

Chickens that produce only female chicks, which would be a huge boost to egg production.

African cattle that are less vulnerable to sleeping sickness, thanks to the genes of a baboon.

And strangest of all goats modified to create an extra protein in their milk which is extracted and spun into a material that is stronger than steel and lighter than carbon fibre.

Whatever will they think of next?

I have always thought it would be great for us farmers if scientists could develop a variety of potato that was immune to potato blight, black-leg, skin scab or frost damage. This would save a fortune on chemical applications and be much better for the environment. We live in hope.

I received some very positive feedback and e-mails regarding my article on Bovine TB last month. Just to emphasise how serious the problem is, there were 3125 cattle culled in January this year due to Bovine TB. 24% increase on last year.

This years lambing has just finished with excellent results. We are glad to report 8 sets of twins from 8 ewes, all frolicking around the orchard.

KINGSLEY WALKING GROUP

On the last Wednesday in March, twelve walkers met at the Community Centre in a heavy snow storm to receive instructions for the day's walk which was to start from the Dunham Arms at Dunham on the Hill. The road up and beyond Meeting House Lane had been cleared of snow, but the 10' high snow drifts either side of the road towered above us and gave the impression that we were in the Alps. There was hardly any snow at the Dunham Arms.

The original route had been altered after the leaders got stuck in deep mud when they 'reckied' the walk a couple of days earlier. The new route went down Hob Lane then across fields and through more mud by Hoblane Farm. It was snowing again as we huddled behind well manicured trees for our coffee break beside the golf course at Bridge Trafford. After crossing the railway at Morley Bridge we meandered back to Dunham-on-the-Hill, sticking to the hard surfaces of the country lanes – certainly preferable to sticking in the soft mud of the fields. There was a warm welcome and good food waiting for us at the Dunham Arms .

On 9 April there was an 8.5 mile walk starting from **Royden Hall** on the Wirral. Leaving the grounds of the hall, tracks were followed to China Plate Farm from where a short road walk gave access to field paths southwards to Grange, skirting the Royal Liverpool golf course. After circling the Grange conservation area, paths were followed to Grange Hill, where a picnic lunch was taken at West Kirby's war memorial, with its vantage over to Hilbre Island..

After lunch the Wirral Way was followed to the site of the former railway station at Caldy from where paths were taken to cross the A540 and ascend Thurstaston Hill, whence a pleasant woodland walk lead the group back to the cars and the 'Barking Mad Cafe ' located in the former hall Coach House. A sunny day, warm when out of the brisk wind.

Kingsley Walking Group have two walks each month: on the second Tuesday there is a long walk of 7 - 8.5 miles (bring a packed lunch); on the last Wednesday a short walk of approx. 5 miles with a coffee break and pub lunch. These included the identification, before DNA, of the Romanoff family by their Dental Records, how Queen Elizabeth 1st 's fear of Dentists led her to suffer from many bouts of terrible tooth ache, the unpredictable behaviour of George Washington's sprung gnashers(!) and the serious consequences of diseases like Syphilis and the exposure to chemicals such as Phosphorous had on the teeth and jaw bones.

Since its introduction from America in the 16th century sugar has presented Dentistry with its biggest challenge through the years. The fact that people are now living longer inevitably means an increase of dental problems. The present day obsession with appearance can also lead to a loss of functional teeth. Strange to think that more men were declared unfit for service in the First World War because of their lack of teeth than for any other reason.Finally we were shown photographs of Donna's trips to developing countries where she gave dental treatments and taught local people how to carry out basic dental procedures.




