Kingsley Characters Gordon Brown

Will Gordon Brown PM be in his job as long as Kingsley's Gordon Brown? I doubt it! Our Gordon has just reached celebrity status by being in the employment of the Warburton family for fifty years, in the past three weeks he has been presented with an award by Geoff Warburton, has had several newspaper interviews and has been on Radio Merseyside, quite a record for a relatively shy, modest man who hadn't realised quite how much he was valued!

Gordon was born in 1934 and at the age of one moved to Frodsham where his

grandparents lived, his grandfather already employed by the Warburton family. His father worked for Thomas Warburton and Gordon, who left school at the age of fifteen, followed in his footsteps and began working on the farm.

In 1956 Gordon married a Runcorn girl, Mary. They set up home at Pear Tree Cottage. Mary used to help out on the farm, picking potatoes and helping in the farmhouse. They had one daughter, Angela, who is now married and lives in Preston Brook. Life went along at a gentle pace, lots of coach holidays all around the UK and their main pastime was walking in the local countryside. Gordon has never owned a car and has never felt that he needed one - in fact his main gripe about life today is the noise and speed of traffic passing his home! Blakelees Chapel played a big part in the life of the Brown family and friendships made there have been lasting.

Gordon entered a sad period of his life in 2000, Mary was diagnosed with cancer. Gordon finished work so that he could be with her, for two years he helped to look after her until her last few weeks when she was moved to Halton Haven. Mary died in 2002 and for the following year Gordon mourned at home surrounded by his family and good friends. Every year, at Christmas time, Gordon, Angela, Victor and grandson, David, attend the service at Halton Haven. After a year of reflection Gordon returned

to work and hasn't stopped, retirement is not part of his vocabulary! "I'll have to stop when my legs give up!"

How does Gordon spend his spare time? He enjoys watching sport on the TV, he is an avid Liverpool fan, and he walks into Kingsley for his shopping - and a chat to friends he meets. Sometimes he catches a bus to Chester, and has a walk by the River Dee and he isn't averse to a little "window shopping." Gordon enjoys attending the services at Blakelees and catching up with local news. He enjoys carol singing around Kingsley at Christmas time.

Gordon is a forward thinking man and he has actively involved himself in the development of farm visits at both of the Warburton farms. He believes in the future of farming and feels that it is important to educate young people in the process of agriculture. He was generous in his comments about the Warburton family, regarding them as his extended family. In Gordon's words - "Farming has been my life."

Long may it continue.

FARM UPDATE NOVEMBER 2007

This fantastic autumn continues. Long sunny days and frosty mornings are causing the leaves to continue to drop. I mentioned last month about the total lack of acorns this year. This is strange, as there is a bumper crop of other fruits and berries. Apples and pears have produced huge amounts of fruit and plums and damsons were hanging so thick that their branches were breaking under the weight. The best show of all this autumn is the holly berries. I have never seen such huge amounts of berries hanging like bunches of red grapes in the holly. The trees look totally red in the sun. I hope the birds don't eat them all before Christmas. Also now that the leaves have fallen off the hedgerows the ivy has enough light to flower. The flowers are a dark colour and are difficult to see.

We have had quite a lot of hedge laying and fencing done this month. Large overgrown hawthorn hedges are trimmed back and laid horizontally. This blocks any gaps in the bottom of the hedge, and eventually makes a stock-proof barrier. This has all been funded by SREP (Sandstone Ridge ECOnet Partnership). SREP is part of Cheshire County Council and helps landowners with environmental projects on their land that borders the sandstone ridge down the centre of Cheshire.

Work on the farm is quieter this month. The land is too wet for tractor work, and harvesting and wheat drilling is finished. Seed potatoes are arriving and need to be put into boxes or trays and stored in a frost proof store. All the cereals and oil seed rape still need spraying with a weed killer and potash needs to be spread to encourage root development.

Cattle are being brought indoors as soon as there is room to get them in off the wet fields. These need to be fed with silage and bedded every day. We have two ponds to excavate and more bird boxes and fencing to erect. I will be kept quite busy. I might even have time to catch up on my paper work!

There are proposals by the Government to extend the area of NVZ's (Nitrate Vulnerable Zones) over our land. These are large areas of the country where nitrates in drinking water are thought to be too high. NVZ's are an attempt to restrict the amount of nitrogen leaching into the water supply from fields. This would severely restrict the timing and amount of nitrogen I can apply to the crops in the form of pig slurry. Pig slurry is excellent natural fertiliser. There are rafts of complicated and expensive regulations being proposed. There are "closed periods" when slurry cannot be applied, depending on the slope of the

field, the crop and the soil type. These are only proposals so far, and a potential nightmare. I hope they are diluted and made more workable.

Gordon Brown, our senior member of staff, who I mentioned in last months edition, has become somewhat of a minor celebrity. He has been inundated with requests for interviews for radio, newspapers and magazines: Radio Merseyside, Chester Chronicle, British Farmer and Grower, Northwich Guardian and Farmers Guardian to name but a few. I keep asking him if Saga has been in contact!!!

Question of the Month:

Is it true that DEFRA are going to cull badgers in an attempt to stop the spread of TB in cattle.

Yes, after years of passionate debate and several Government funded reports, DEFRA have finally decided to cull some badgers in TB hotspots as a trial. TB (Tuberculosis) is present in badgers in the wild and also in cattle. All cattle must be routinely tested, some annually, some every two years, depending on where you live. Cattle found to be carrying TB are called 'reactors' and are compulsorily slaughtered. This is because TB can be transferred into the cows' milk and passed on to humans. Obviously, this is a huge problem for dairy farmers. The environmentalists say that the badgers are catching TB off the cattle, and the farmers say the cattle are catching TB off the badgers. Nothing has been scientifically proven either way. This is a political and very emotive subject: so far the Government would rather slaughter the cows than the badgers. This is not rectifying the problem. What do you think?
